



The NHS is prioritising those most at risk for the COVID-19 booster vaccine.



The NHS will let you know when it's your turn.

Last week it was announced that all adults will be offered a COVID-19 booster by the end of January.

It was also announced that the time between a second vaccine and a booster will be reduced from six months to three, and that 12 to 15 year olds are recommended to have a second vaccine 12 weeks after their first.

After the JCVI made their announcements last Monday, the NHS confirmed that those at greatest risk will continue to be prioritised and the current eligible groups remain at this time.

Younger groups will then start to be invited in descending age order over the coming weeks.

The NHS will be in touch to let people know when it's their turn.

We are urging anyone who isn't yet eligible to please wait to be contacted by the NHS for your booster. Please don't attend a walk in service as at the current time we cannot offer it to you.

If you are 40 and over, or 16 and over in one of the clinical at risk groups and you haven't yet had your booster or got an appointment – please use the National Booking System website or 119 to arrange your vaccine or book online at the Glebe Surgery. If you have a booked appointment, please make sure you attend this and receive your booster vaccine.

To date more than 3 million vaccinations have been given in Sussex, with more than 70,000 vaccines being offered each week.
